## OVERHEAD POWER LINE CONTACT

Electrical, Heavy Equipment, Outdoors

Before operating equipment or starting any outdoor task, take a moment to scan the area for overhead lines. Power lines are not always easy to spot, and one moment of inattention can lead to a fatal mistake.

The best way to prevent tragedy is simple:

Look up before you lift, move, drive, or climb. Every time.

Keep your distance from overhead power lines.

- ➤ Carry ladders, poles, and long tools horizontally, never upright.
- ➤ Avoid parking or positioning equipment directly beneath or near power lines.
- Lower dump beds and booms completely before driving.
- ➤ Mark power line locations with flags and warning signs when working nearby.
- ➤ Keep equipment beyond the designated clearance limits at all times.

If you see a vehicle or equipment that has made contact with a power line:

- · Do not approach it.
- Warn others to stay back at least 35 feet.
- Wet ground can carry electricity even farther so move away even further.
- Call 911 immediately and wait for trained professionals.

If you are inside a vehicle that has made contact with a power line:

- Stay inside and call 911. Warn others not to come near.
- But, if you see <u>fire or smoke</u>, you must know how to exit safely.
  - 1. Do not touch the ground and the vehicle at the same time.
  - 2. Jump from the vehicle with your feet together.
  - 3. Shuffle away without lifting your feet.
